



If you're like us, you've undoubtedly seen your fair share of dream-like backyard gardens across social media. Where families joyfully harvest their vegetables and herbs, bursting with flavor and nutrients. Then, they whip up enchanting and exquisite dishes that could rival those of the great Julia Child herself. Well, quit imagining; your home garden dream is not out of reach! We're here to show you that you can easily create and maintain the backyard garden of your dreams, regardless of your space, through edible container plantings.














## Selecting The Right Container

Regardless of the size of your space, container plantings are a flexible and creative way to add dimension to your outdoor areas. When deciding the type of container to use, there are three factors to consider: **size**, **material**, **and drainage**.

### SIZE

A common mishap for those new to edible container gardening is underestimating the space needed to select flowers, vegetables, and herbs. You want to ensure your plants have enough space to grow to their full potential. To help, see our guide for some common vegetables and herbs you may plant and the minimum container size they need.

If you are interested in planting more than one variety in your edible container, another size consideration is the amount of spacing needed between your plants. Although the specific amount of spacing will vary between varieties, your container should allow for about two to four inches between each plant at a minimum.

#### **MATERIAL**

There are endless choices regarding container materials that are safe for plants, including wood, clay, fiber, and plastic. You also want to make sure that your container is weather-proof. Ultimately, you should choose a container that fits both you and your plants.

#### **DRAINAGE**

Lastly, your container must have drainage, regardless of size or material. Your container's drainage can determine the success or failure of your edible gardens. You will find or need to add holes to the bottom or lower sides of your container for drainage.

If your container has drainage on the bottom, slightly elevate it from the ground to allow excess water to flow out. If it has drainage on the lower sides, you can let your container rest on the ground.

Once you have double-checked that your container fits the size, material, and drainage criteria of your flowers, vegetables, and herbs, we can get to the fun part—planting.

## Planting Your Edible Garden

It's peak Springtime in May, the weather is consistently warm, and you have your perfect container - let's get gardening! You'll need a few more items alongside your plants and container to get started:

#### SOIL

If you're planning on container gardening, choosing a growing medium that's lightweight and porous is essential. You want one that stays loose, drains well, stays moist, and provides the proper nutrients for your plants to grow. It's best to use an all-purpose potting mix like Espoma Organic Garden Soil, made up a rich blend of the finest natural ingredients and enhanced with earthworm castings, feather meal, alfalfa meal, kelp meal, yucca extract and our proprietary blend of mycorrhizae. Avoid using garden soil in containers as it's usually too dense and won't provide adequate plant aeration and drainage.

#### **FERTILIZER**

There are a few options to supplement your soil. You can incorporate products like Master Nursery® Bumper Crop® Organic Soil Builder into the soil when planting. Another option is to apply slowrelease pellet fertilizer like **Osmocote** on top of the soil at planting. Lastly, you can use water-soluble fertilizer like **Espoma's Grow!** Throughout the life of your plants at the recommended rate outlined in the product. When it comes to fertilizers, more is not better. Follow the product instructions and only apply the minimum amount needed for your plants.



## Mix

Mix water into the soil until it is damp. If using compost, add it to the soil. Fill the container to the desired height, typically about an inch from the top.



## Add

Add plant. Using your fingers or a shovel, dig a hole to the size of your plant's starting point. If starting with seed, sow the seeds at the depth indicated on the seed packet. If starting with young plants, lightly loosen the roots at the bottom, keeping the overall root ball intact.



## Unite

Accommodate your plant to its new home. If using pellet fertilizer, add the indicated amount on the top. Add water to meld your plant into the soil.

#### COMMON PROBLEMS IN CONTAINER GARDENING

PROBLEM	CAUSE	SOLUTION
Plants wilt even with enough water	Poor drainage or Aeration	Either use lighter soil mix or increase the amount of drainage holes
Leaf edges die or "burn: turning dry and brittle	High salt content	At regular intervals, leach container by watering until water drains from holes
Plants look "leggy", spindly and unproductive	Not enough light or Too much nitrogen	Move plants to an area with more light or apply fertilizer less often and water to drain
Plant begins yellowing	Too much water or Not fertile enough	Water less frequently and check drainage or use fertilizer with higher level of nutrients
Leaves have spots or pow- dery areas	Area too cold or low phosphate levels or plant diseases	Move to warmer area, remove infected area or use fertilizer with a higher concentration of phosphate
Leaves have small holes or are distorted in shape	Insect damage	Use insecticide, like Neem Oil, suited to the insect damage

## Maintaining Your Edible Garden INSECTS & DISEASE

#### WATERING

Watering can be a challenging part of maintaining your edible garden. Still, we have some tips to help you determine the best ways. When plants are grown in containers, they tend to dry out much faster than when grown in the ground. To ensure that your plants are adequately hydrated, you should water them once the soil feels dry. Watering may need to be done daily in hot and dry weather. However, avoid waiting too long to water your plants, as excessively dry soil can damage them. To water your plants thoroughly, add water until it runs out of the drainage holes, preferably in the morning. While being attentive is essential, over-watering can be fatal to your edible garden; therefore, always check the soil before watering.

#### LIGHTING

For healthy growth, most vegetables and annual flowers require at least six hours of full sun. Therefore, place your containers in areas that receive enough light.

#### STAKING

For plants like tomatoes that may start to slouch once they grow stake them. We have a wide variety for any size container.

It can be frustrating to diagnose and treat insects or diseases in plants. Regular inspections can help you find and resolve these issues quickly. If you need assistance, the team at Bayport Flower Houses is well-educated in addressing any problems you may encounter. Cornell Cooperative Extension has also put together a chart of common issues, causes, and solutions to help you maintain healthy and happy plants.
